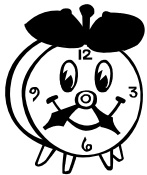

parent in our house these days.
Along with the usual round of meet-
ings that I attend within our
church—session, confirmation, wor-
ship committee—I also have a
monthly meeting with the other
Presbyterian pastors in the area,
meetings of the presbytery and of
the three presbytery committees
and ministry teams on which I

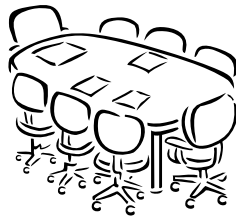

serve, and now have added another session meeting as well: I am currently serving as Moderator of the Session of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Casselton, now that their pastor has moved on to a new call. Throw in Toni's meetings and the kids' activities, and we spend an awful lot of time working our schedule around one meeting or another.

But why do we meet so much within the church? And why do I end up having so many meetings outside our congregation? The answers to these questions point out some of the most distinctive and powerful features of our Presbyterian identity.



First, our congregational life is indeed shaped and guided by meetings. Whether it be the session, the boards of deacons or building trustees, or any of the several committees that we have constituted, we try to make all of the important decisions in the life of the church in groups. This is because, to be frank, we are all flawed and fallible, our vision distorted by sin. By coming together to try to discern God's will for us, we do our best to cancel out the errors that we as individuals inevitably make. In other words, if nine elders of session believe that God is calling us to a certain decision, we are more confident in that discernment than if only one person believed it. As Presbyterians, we believe that the best way to faithfully respond to God's call is to be guided in that response by a group who are particularly chosen for that responsibility.

But what of meetings outside the congregation? Why do I, along with several other members of our church, spend so much time engaging in conversations and decisions at the presbytery level?

The answer, put most succinctly, is that we are a connectional church. We believe that we are not simply called to be members of one particular congregation, but rather that we are also called to be members of a larger church, one that can reach farther into the needs of the world, and accomplish more than any individual congregation can alone.

The examples of this expanded reach are many. Our partnership with the Chogoria presbyteries in Kenya, our support of various relief and mission efforts through One Great Hour of Sharing, the youth retreat that our young folks enjoy in Jamestown every year, and Presbyterian Clearwater Forest Bible Camp are just the tip of the iceberg.

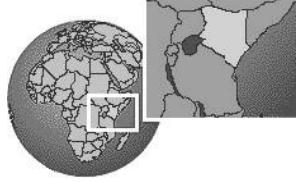
What may well be even more important is the way our connectional nature allows us to help and support other congregations in time of need, showing the world that we are indeed the One Body of Christ, as he wishes us to be. My service to Casselton is the same that their former pastor, Kari Jutila, offered to our church in the time before I came to serve here. And whenever there are transitions in the lives of the churches of our presbytery, or indeed anywhere in our denomination, people like us, acting through committees and boards of presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly, will be there to join with our brothers and sisters in discerning God's will for them and his call to the church. I guess all those meetings aren't so bad, after all.

BLAIR'S AFRICAN NEWS



Dear Friends and Family,
Greetings from Nairobi!

While talks in the political scene seem to be moving forward steadily in Kenya, work in the office is taking off quickly. I had both a desk and a computer when I started work, but our office is expanding, and I have limited access to either one – so I'm sort of bouncing from office to office right now. It's actually a perfectly fine work environment. I get to see a lot more of various coworkers, and it keeps the blood flowing.

In one of the offices my colleague likes to listen to the radio, and every day at 10 a.m., we do our typing to the backdrop of an American radio evangelist (naturally). Sometimes our difference in religious opinions is distracting (me and the evangelist, not me and my colleague). I start disagreeing with him in my head instead of e-mailing one of our ecumenical partners, but yesterday he said something very interesting. He was talking about the fact that many of his congregants tell him they want to start all over again in their careers and go into the ministry. He sagely advises them that anytime they become parents or true friends they are in fact in the ministry.

While I thought that was a fabulous interpretation of ministry, the fact that so many people want to get further involved in the church was also a heartening thought. In that moment I really paused to think about how fortunate I am to be focusing on God in the workplace and being a small - but constructive - piece of the big picture of religious social action.

Outside of work, life has also been moving quickly. I went to Tanzania two weeks ago for a retreat with the other YAVs. We stayed at this amazing community center that offers computer classes, women's empowerment workshops, and a music recording studio. We were there on my 23rd birthday, relaxing in luscious Arusha, TZ, one of the cities that Bush just visited in his Africa tour. I also taught my first Sunday School lesson last week on Adam and Eve. Just the creation part, not the introduction of sin into the world part. Hopefully, that will come next week when the other teacher is on duty; it might be too much for a rookie in a different cultural setting.

I hope that all is well in West Fargo. You all are in my prayers.

The Clerk will correspond with Desiree Gold about the charges for use of the church.

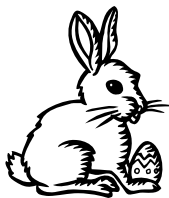

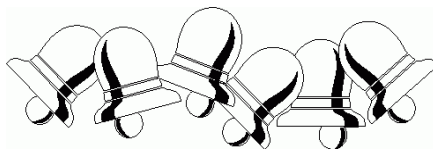

As of Feb. 17, 2008, the year to date actual giving to CPC's general fund is \$17,399 compared to the \$19,908 budgeted for the same time period.

These figures do not include the mortgage payments which are funded from the building fund money market (Project Open Door giving).

The response to "Adopt an Expense" (the program implemented to pay off the 2007 note balance) has been a great success! 10 gifts totaling \$3,000 have already been received, plus, Presbyterian Women donated \$1,000. A total of \$4,000 has been paid on the note, but \$7,600 is still needed. Many are thinking about becoming involved in this effort. Thank you!

In conclusion, I learned all these things about Dave Ruhnke and, now, so have you. Thanks for sitting down and reading the interview that I did with him.

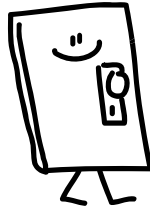

February 13--Bob Galt, Lynn Hummel, Andrew Thostenson, and Larry Peihl, Session Liaison, were in attendance. Derrick Leopold, Bob Olson, and Don Van Cleve were absent.

Andrew reported that he installed a light over the sink in the narthex.

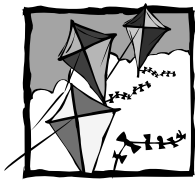
Bob Galt reported that he put an inspection plate over an a wall opening that was not used as part of the fire alarm system in the old basement hallway.

Bob Galt also reported on cabinet/shelf proposals for the office and indicated that orders will be placed the week of February 18th. When an estimated delivery date is confirmed, he will alert the trustees. Then, a Saturday can be scheduled to install them. Andrew Thostenson added that at the same time we could sheetrock and finish the old basement window opening in the "Branches & Vine" room in the older portion of the basement. This was agreed to.

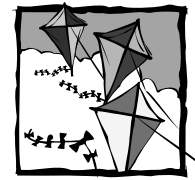
The trustees considered some drop down lighting in the old basement hallway as a means to improve visibility and as a means to hide some of the fire suppression pipes and conduits. Andrew promised to follow-up on getting some price estimates.







The trustees also explored ideas for securing the outside reader board sign (The sign is currently held in place by sandbags.) Other discussion points were: securing input from the congregation on establishing some flower beds, cleaning out the old shed, and developing a more visually appealing downspout system than the existing old and tattered sheet metal ones.

The next meeting of the trustees will be March 12 at 7:00 p.m.
