JACK ATTACK ROUND 4

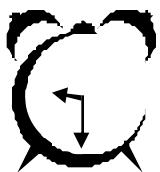

PASTOR'S PEN

Ah, spring! We have finally (knock on wood) escaped from the abnormally long grip of winter's cold and dreary weather, and have arrived at a time of year that all of us, I expect, have reason to look forward to. For many of us, spring and summer are the times when we can once again engage in outdoor activities that we enjoy, but must be set aside for the winter. Softball, cooking out, fishing (I haven't quite picked up the ice-fishing bug yet.), and running outdoors are on my list. Others are excited to be able to work in the garden, go on picnics, or simply sit outside on the porch. All of these things are well worth the excitement, I think.



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Right now, I am especially excited about the prospect of my upcoming hiking trip. I will be backpacking on the beautiful Superior Hiking Trail on the north shore of Lake Superior with two good friends, both colleagues from the PhD program at Princeton, who live far away. So not only am I happy to be able to indulge one of my outdoor hobbies, I am also really looking forward to spending time with these guys, with whom I am usually only in contact by email or phone. The chance to step away from all the various business that ordinarily occupies our time and simply enjoy the company of friends is at least as important as the scenery, exercise, and fresh air. All in all, I can hardly wait.

I sometimes wonder, though, if we don't spend a little too much of our energy, devote a little too much of our time, and place a little too much of our hopes on our leisure activities. After all, don't we have work to do? Aren't we called to bear the yoke, to earn our bread by the sweat of our brow (see Genesis 3:19), and so forth? And didn't Jesus give us all sorts of jobs to do? After all, making disciples of all the world and being witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and unto the ends of the Earth sounds like pretty much a 24/7 occupation. When we consider how much there is in the world that needs fixing, or attention, or improvement, we might be inclined to feel a bit conflicted about our leisure. I recall, from my Princeton days, a list of items posted under the heading, "You might be a graduate student if...". One item on the list was "...you've accepted guilt as an inherent part of recreation". There is certainly a strand within our Christian heritage that would replace



"graduate student" with "Christian" in this formula and otherwise keep it intact as a rule for all of life. How can we go out and enjoy ourselves, when there is so much work to do? Shouldn't we all just buckle down to the work, accepting for ourselves the old, mocking definition of a Puritan as "a person who is desperately afraid that someone, somewhere is having a good time"?

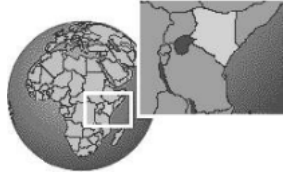
Well, we certainly oughtn't to live life only as an arena for the pursuit of our pleasures. Such hedonism is a sure recipe for personal destruction and societal collapse. But, at the same time, our Master has specifically instructed us that work is not all that we are made for, either:

"I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." (John 10:10)

With these words, Jesus reminds his disciples that his entire Incarnation is intended to give his people a full life, a life that includes an abundance of all good things. This includes both meaningful work and healthy play. We are to labor diligently in the callings that we have been given, for the good of the church, the Kingdom, our families, and the communities around us. But we are also to take, in good, full measure, time to enjoy the good, the beautiful, and the pleasurable things that God has made and ordained for us. By doing so, we honor him, and fulfill our own highest purpose. The Westminster Shorter Catechism puts it quite succinctly: "Man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy him forever."

Accordingly, let us all give glory to God, both in our work and in our enjoyment of the abundant life that he has graciously given us.

BLAIR'S AFRICAN NEWS



Dear Family and Friends,

I mentioned a few months ago that I am no longer in possession of a desk. Or a permanent office for that matter. Generally my days are spent in the library at a computer which is pretty much mine, but was reserved for library patrons before I showed up in Nairobi. At 4:00 p.m. every day I pack up and move over to the 9th General Assembly office proper while my closest colleague (there are 3 of us in the Assembly office: 1. boss 2. consultant = my closest colleague and 3. intern = me) goes to class. I have to say that this is an ideal set up. I can't imagine sitting in one place all day, and I love running all around the building. I'm serious. It's nice not to be tied down.

And in fact, I've noticed a not too dissimilar trend in my life in general. I don't like to be tied to things quite as much as I used to. For example, when I came to Kenya with my two suitcases, I remember thinking, "They told us we could leave all our belongings at our placements, but I can't possibly return from Kenya without my red sweater." I would still like to come to the US with my red sweater, but it is not a matter of life and death the way it seemed in August. I have not become unworldly in any sense of the word – just ask my parents about my ecstatic response when they say they're sending packages – but maybe just slightly less worldly.

I do look forward to shopping at Target when I come home, and the idea of doing so with a Starbucks in hand is strangely exciting. But I also understand that people I know can't even afford the 25 cent ears of corn sold on street corners at lunch time. In this knowledge, there is a definite perspective shift.

Starbucks is not a necessity. I live down the street from what recently became a UN High Commissioner for Refugees building, and there are people who sleep outside it at night. (Did I really start this paragraph by talking about Starbucks?) You can't walk by people sleeping on the gravel lawn as Kenya's winter approaches and be the same person. You can be 99.9% the same person I suppose, and you can outwardly seem just the same, but little by little exposure to new and challenging experiences changes who you are.

I never studied abroad in college; I went abroad for a school program one summer and that was it. I was very nervous to take that cultural-immersing leap, living in a foreign country for a whole semester seemed impossible. But now I see the importance of getting outside the familiar, because simply being in a new place alters your perceptions. I am so thankful for the chance to come to Kenya and be exposed to more of this divinely created planet. In particular, let me express my gratitude to you, because when CPC's check came to the PC (USA) headquarters, I officially reached my personal fundraising goal until August. Thank you again for your support that comes in so many forms; I don't know where – or what – I would be without it.

Session met on Thursday, May 22nd, at 7:00 p.m.

The Personnel Committee will discuss hiring an applicant for the youth director position. Salary terms will be the same as those now in effect. Boots Misheski made a report on the presbytery meeting in Jamestown and encouraged members to attend the fall meeting of the presbytery at the Moorhead church.

Session approved Blair Moorhead's request to hold a fund raiser to help her with expenses to extend her stay in

Kenya until December when she plans to assist with the All African Conference of Churches' 9th General Assembly. She plans to hold a Kenyan Tea Party. She will be serving traditional Kenyan foods and telling about her year in Kenya.

Several items were discussed relating to the trustees. These will be addressed in the trustees report elsewhere in this newsletter.

Karen Steele has been made the liaison for the deacons for anyone needing help because of illness, etc.

The mission focus for June is Clearwater Forest Bible Camp and the committee hopes to raise \$500 to purchase a kayak. School supplies will be collected between now and the end of July for the big school supply drive. August mission project will be the YWCA. The Mission and Outreach Committee is reviewing some ideas for an out-reach event.

Toni Stith will be the coordinator for Sunday School for 2008-09 and Carrie Leopold is the coordinator for 2008 Vacation Bible School.

Thank you so much for supporting this mission.

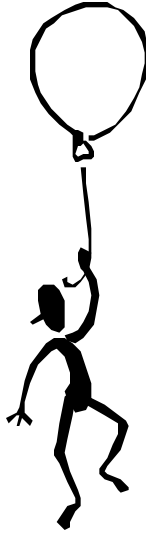

The trustees spent about 45 minutes inspecting the downspout situation and planning the summer work needs.

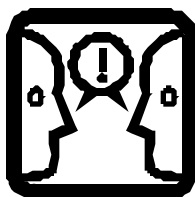

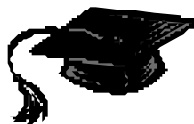
